"No One Dies Alone"

New Program Begins

Staff and volunteers at Hospice of Yuma are privileged to serve people at one of the most important times of their lives. If you ask someone what they fear most about dying, the universal response is dying in pain and dying alone. We all wish for a painless, peaceful, dignified death in the presence of someone who cares. These goals are at the core of everything Hospice of Yuma strives for as we care for the terminally ill.

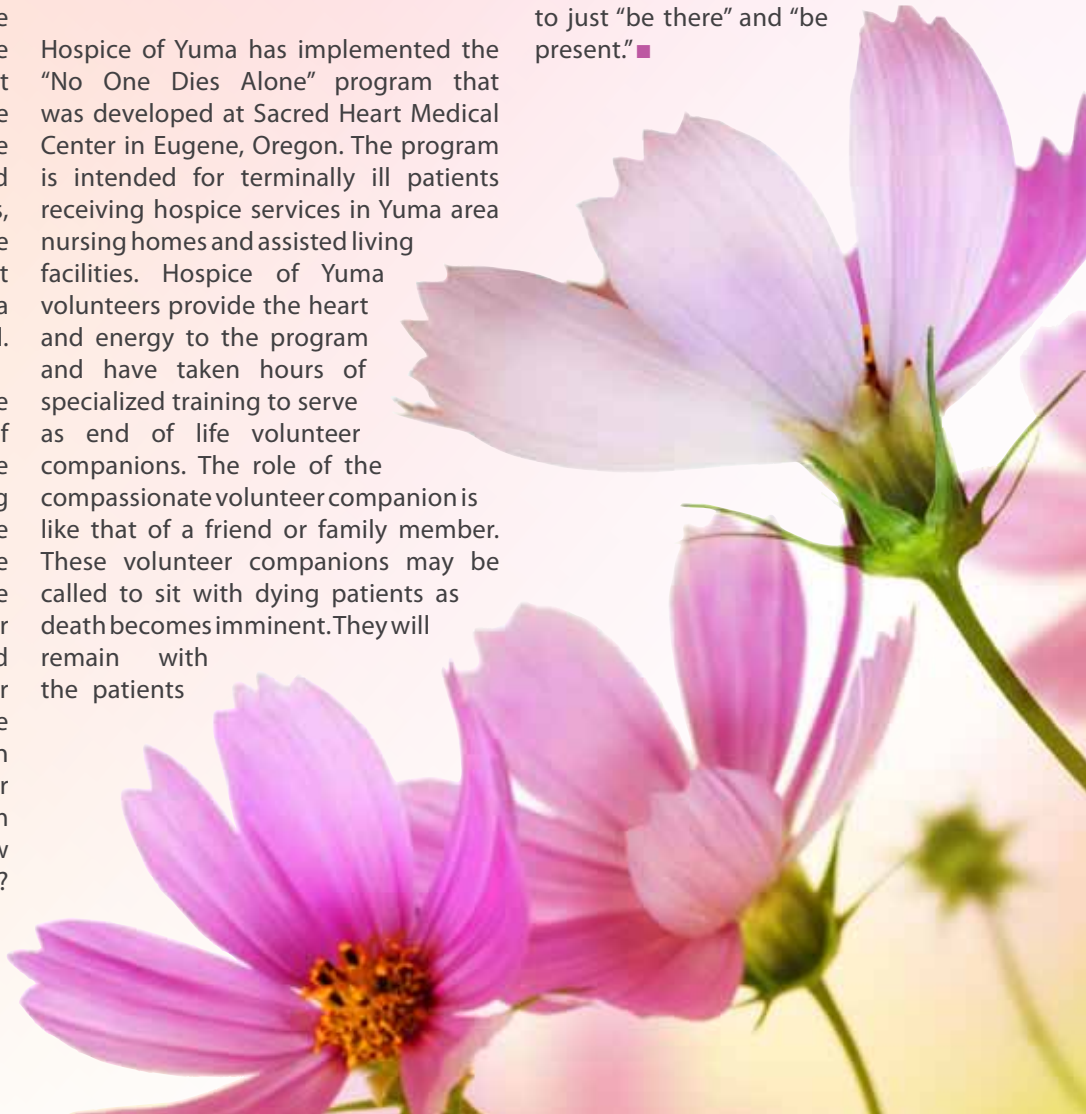
As with all medical care there are sometimes gaps that appear. Areas of need that must be addressed to ensure dying patients are able to have caring people present with them to provide comfort at the time of their death. Have you ever wondered what happens to the person who lives in a nursing home or assisted living facility who has outlived family and friends, or the lone traveler or winter visitor who is not able to make it back to their home to die? What if an individual is homeless – by choice or circumstance – has lived life away from family and mainstream society and now finds themselves alone and terminally ill?

Mother Teresa said, "No one should die alone... each human should die with the sight of a loving face." We

at Hospice of Yuma realize that we can make this a reality. We can provide companionship to dying patients who are truly alone, and in so doing, provide a gift of respect and dignity to another human being at the end of life.

Hospice of Yuma has implemented the "No One Dies Alone" program that was developed at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Eugene, Oregon. The program is intended for terminally ill patients receiving hospice services in Yuma area nursing homes and assisted living facilities. Hospice of Yuma volunteers provide the heart and energy to the program and have taken hours of specialized training to serve as end of life volunteer companions. The role of the compassionate volunteer companion is like that of a friend or family member. These volunteer companions may be called to sit with dying patients as death becomes imminent. They will remain with the patients

quietly reading, playing gentle music, perhaps holding a hand. Our dedicated nurses, physicians and aides will attend to the physical needs of our dying patients; our comforting companion volunteers MOST important task is to just "be there" and "be present." ■

Become a Hospice of Yuma volunteer

Every year, millions of Americans die from illnesses such as heart disease, cancer, stroke and diabetes. And every year, according to the Hospice Foundation of America, over 400,000 hospice volunteers help many of these people through their last few months of life.

Hospice volunteers provide all kinds of support for patients and their families, including visiting, reading, watching T.V., taking walks, and playing music. Volunteers also help with shopping, errands, household chores, and provide respite. They can help with bereavement support, get involved in fundraising events, volunteer at the hospice thrift shop and provide administrative support for hospice by filing or sending out mailings.

When someone is dying, friends and family sometimes pull away, afraid of what is happening and at a loss for what to say. A hospice volunteer helps fill that gap by being a companion who understands the process of dying and provides compassion, comic relief and conversation.

Because death is such a sensitive issue, hospice volunteers go through extensive training that teaches them the history of hospice, the goals and philosophy of care, emergency procedures and what to expect during the stages of death.

The training also helps volunteers develop the communication skills necessary to comfort and support patients and families, and explains the emotional and spiritual needs of patients at the end of life. Hospice of Yuma will be starting a volunteer training course July 25, 2011. For more information contact Elizabeth Nunez, Volunteer Coordinator at 928-343-2222. ■

I know, I know, charitable giving is the furthest thing from your mind during the summer. Platinum Benefactor.....\$1,000.00 per year

Some individuals wish to make their contributions on a monthly, quarterly or semi-annual basis.

Moving On To “Summer”

Casey learns how to live life without Tom

Casey has slowly begun to identify that her heart is not as heavy as in the past, her spirit beginning to lift. With this she confirms spring has passed, summer has come. Reviewing her journal identifies the numerous steps taken to bring her to where she is today. Grief remains as do the memories of the years with Tom. She is sure Tom would be proud to know the journey she has taken these past months, the ups and downs, the tears, the commitment to rebuilding her life.

Casey has accepted a part-time job at the town library. Willingness to learn and the ability to give to others has opened the door to a group coordinator position. She finds herself planning reading projects for youngsters as well as community programs for adults. Almost daily there is conversation with someone who has walked in her shoes having experienced the death of a loved one. Sharing stories has allowed Casey to learn her grief is not unlike others, that there is a comfort in sharing, and that she is normal. New friendships and interests she has developed.

Some changes to her home have been made. In memory of Tom, a garden area has been planted with his favorite flowers and placement of a memory stone. Furniture has been moved, pictures relocated, some things kept, some things donated to a thrift shop. Casey has made sure that every room has some

memory of Tom as his memory will be etched in her heart forever. Days have become more meaningful; evenings, for the most part, are kept for reminiscing, journaling, praying and spending quality time with Emily, who continues to be her best friend and constant companion.

A book received from a friend soon after Tom's death addressed "After The First Year – Then What?" With some trepidation, Casey looks ahead to her second year alone. She is sure her friendships will continue; she has found ways to manage her finances and has found helpful professionals who have provided guidance these last multiple months. She now comes to know she will survive. One chapter in her book indicates "subsequent years are not quite as pain filled as was the first." Ongoing chapters have information helpful to continue her grief journey (i.e. "check frequently that you have balance in your life – work, recreation, adequate rest and prayer"; "consider even though you are struggling with grief, you would rather have had that person at all"; "grief is different for everyone – it is like fingerprints or snowflakes, no two are alike."

Casey finds herself welcoming the warmth of the summer season and the coming of 'next year.' She is sure that she will survive as Tom's memory and Emily's company give her courage to go forth. She knows there will be ups and downs; however

she is prepared to meet the challenge.

Casey expresses thanks for sharing her story. If you are grieving a loss she encourages you to take time for yourself, to learn the steps of the grief process, to find a friend with whom you can talk, to know your tears will dry but more will come, to not expect too much from your family or friends, to set realistic goals for the future, to take time for grief work. She confirms healing grief IS work; like learning anything new, progress will be made, the future will develop day by day by day.

Note: By reading Casey's story you have shared the seasons of her grief. As readers, you may have walked through, or are walking through the seasons of grief yourself. As said, Casey's life will continue; she will laugh again, she will teach others from personal lessons, she will always keep the memories of the past... so will you. ■
